The event all together was very educational about Pacific Mission Aviation and their support in relieving Yap from devastation. PMA has delivered 49,880 lbs. of goods, has flown a total of 19 days and spending 51.2 hours of flying. After the event we spoke with Mr. Norbert Kalau, the President of Pacific Mission Aviation and Melinda Espinosa the Chief of Financial Officer of Pacific Mission Aviation and learned a bit about them personally. Today's event not only included updates on Typhoon Maysak Relief but it had awarded the Herminia Dierking scholarships to students. - *Jasmine Basset, Public Admin major*

The guest speakers for the day were Norbert Kalau and Melinda Espinosa

from the Pohnpei and Guam Pacific Mission Aviation (PMA). Their presentation today was regarding their mission during (and still continuing) Typhoon Maysak Relief. Since Guam, the Federated States of Micronesia, Micronesia as a whole, and as well as the Philippines are in the Pacific, these islands are the ones a part of their mission. From what I also gathered about Typhoon Maysak is that not only was there major destruction, but people lost their lives as well. I can only imagine and empathize what the victims of those islands went through and how they feel now, as well as the people of Pacific Mission Aviation who went out of their way to help and sadly, witness the disasters. It is important to know that there are amazing, kind-hearted people out there like them, who provide their time and service to those who are less fortunate or are in need. As a public administration and criminal justice major, I should always keep this in mind. It is always a rewarding feeling to do such good deeds and that is probably what they feel as they help these people and one reason why they continue to do so. I personally think PMA did an impressive job in immediately distributing to the Yap community the basic necessities and the perishable items. The island of Guam definitely needs to support and fund these types of organizations. A suggestion would be to have the Government of Guam employees contribute minimal monetary value such as one dollar or a coin drive or even conduct fundraiser events where the full proceeds is given to the organization. When I was browsing PMA's brochure, I noticed that their core values is based on the acronym L.E.A.D.E.R. I was a bit surprised that a very religious organization was able to "bring hope and change lives" through their mission and vision statement. Majority of the organizations in Guam do not really focus on promoting Christ fellowship however is in a different direction where their main priority is to provide the local community plainly programs and services. This action definitely demonstrates that AGA is a solid foundation in outreaching to the community and exhibiting a good model for college students and the general public. Overall, the meeting was surprisingly enlightening and relaxed. I look forward in hopefully becoming a future member of AGA Guam Chapter. – *Julie Maldonado, Accounting major*

What I found most interesting about PMB was the different ways in which the company made contact with the villages and were able to deliver the goods. PMB uses one private air vessel, a ship named Sea Haven, by land (i.e. roads needed), and by radios and newsletters. The mission of PMB is, “Every island hears about the Word of God”. It breaks my heart knowing that there are people whose homes have been destroyed that their way of living is going to change for a while until the islands can begin operating normally. In fact, the Outer Islands High School (OIHS), which is the only school that provides education in Utihi and the rest of the islands has been destroyed and won't be operational for about a year. I'm glad to see society coming together to aid our neighboring islanders. PMB has been helping these people for years by offering medical assistance (i.e. cataract surgery and dental cleanings), supplying the islands with food and water, and most importantly textbooks for education. – *Jared Roberto, Accounting major*

The meeting started with the award-

ing of the Herminia Dierking Scholarship to the deserving students namely Jared Andrada and Clarabelle Santos. The awarding ceremony have proven that the University of Guam School of Business offers the quality accounting program that our, I am glad that I chose to stay and get my bachelor's at the University. I also find that the scholarship will really help the two recipients, which are my close friends since they are graduating seniors and will be attending the CPA review sessions at the university right after graduation. Jared and Clarabelle really deserved the scholarship as they already planned to use the grant for their CPA review, which is very helpful and important as they enter the accounting field right after graduation. During the meeting, Norbert Kalau, President of the Pacific Mission Aviation, and Melinda Espinosa, Chief Financial officer of the PMA had a presentation on the updates of the typhoon Maysak Relief that hit our neighboring Islands. As Ms. Melinda had her presentation where she showed the aftermath of the typhoon, it really broke my heart. The presentation saddened me as these people from FSM had to experience that strong typhoon. I had experienced strong typhoons in the Philippines before I moved here in Guam, but what I experienced is nothing compared to the ones that hit the islands of the Federated States of Micronesia. Typhoon Maysak really devastated the island of Yap; anyone who sees the picture on the presentation would think that no one would survive. As a response to the calamity that hits the islands of the Federated States of Micronesia, the Association of Government Accountants donated \$500 to the Pacific Mission Aviation. – *Romar Tapeceria, Accounting major*

The presentation was an eye-opener in regards to the reality of how volatile other islands in Micronesia can be. It is an incredible feeling to actually have organizations out there that are ready and willing to get out of their

way to reach out and help the victims of typhoon Maysak. Despite the fact that it is extremely hard to reach the other parts of each island due to landslides and fallen trees, the organization's members found ways to ensure that they reach all parts of each island to distribute the various relief goods. I greatly applaud Pacific Mission Aviation for their effort. Ms. Espinosa and Mr. Kalau are true heroes, together with all their staffs and all the organizations that extended their help in providing goods and services to make the relief mission happen. It is not every day that we see people going out of their way and risking their lives in order to save others. Despite the damages of Typhoon Maysak, the people of the various islands are still very fortunate to have neighbors that reached out and lent their helping hands. It is during devastations and other calamities that we see people work together and show love and care for one another. Sometimes, it is regrettable to see that only during these times that we experience unity in the community. People are so caught up in their daily lives that they forget to stop and take time to smile and socialize with other people. They wait for problems to happen to start reaching out. Despite the fact I mentioned, the good inside all of us is seen and tested during hard times, which is still better than not doing anything at all. – *Charmaine Orbe, Accounting major*

I really think that PMA has given so much of their time and effort in providing relief for the victims of Typhoon Maysak. It makes me feel really thankful that Guam as well as my family in Saipan was safe. I could not imagine how hard it would be to lose a home, water supply, and even schools. Hearing how long it will take just for the islanders to recover their only school is devastating. If I were rich, I would honestly donate so much to PMA as well as the people of FSM

The Mark of Excellence in Federal, State and Local Government

CGFM is a professional certification recognizing the unique skills and special knowledge required of today's government financial managers. It covers governmental accounting, auditing, financial reporting, internal controls and budgeting at the federal, state and local levels.

Interested in attaining the CGFM Certification?

If you are interested in becoming a CGFM, your AGA Guam Chapter offers CGFM Scholarships by providing reimbursements for your registration and test fees when you pass the CGFM examination within one (1) year.

The Chapter also offers and provides CGFM review materials to its members by borrowing the Chapter's study guides. The Guam Chapter may sponsor a CGFM preparation course on Guam and also promote study groups to assist its members.

Maintaining CGFM Certification

To retain the CGFM certification, all CGFMs must adhere to the AGA's Code of Ethics. In addition, to continue using the CGFM designation after their name, CGFMs must be in an active status.

Active Status

To maintain the CGFM certification in an active status, CGFMs are required to:

- Pay the CGFM renewal Fee by the due date every year.
- Complete at least 80 hours of Continuing Professional Education (CPE) every two years in government

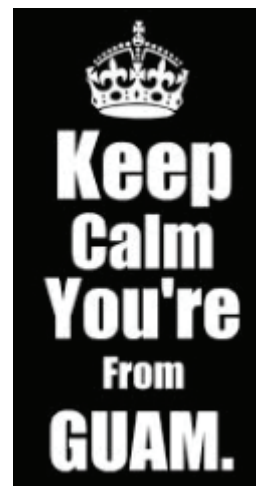

- Maintain and, if requested by AGA, provide detailed information on CPE hours completed.

By submitting their annual renewal payment, CGFMs affirm that they have and will continue to abide by AGA's Code of Ethics and that they have fulfilled the minimum CPE Requirements

AGA Guam Chapter: Know Your Certified Government Financial Manager

How did you get involved with AGA?

I relocated in Guam in 2009 and had no professional acquaintances. Given the opportunity to work for a company whose contracts are mainly with federal and governments, I was able to meet people in finance who has been actively involved with AGA Guam chapter. They invited me to join the organization while considering that this is a great opportunity for me to keep myself abreast of the CPE's offered. Later, I was convinced to take the CGFM exam and was fortunate to be given the AGA scholarship for exam fees reimbursement.

Why did you decide to earn the CGFM Certification?

After receiving my CPA license in 2009, I decided to pursue another license which can build up my credentials. Knowing that passing the CGFM exam is a plus when applying for a government position, I decided to pursue the certification. In addition, any company who pursue government and federal contracts would want to have a CGFM credentials leading their finance team to have the additional edge when it comes to the qualification of their management team when packaging their bid requirements.

How has the CGFM enhanced your career?

Having the CGFM certification adds more credibility to once credentials. In general, when people know that you are a holder of that certification people would immediately think about a person who has high regard for integrity and knows the ethical responsibility. Having that certification after your name attracts more confidence to future employers.

What's the most important issue today in govern-

ment financial management?

I think the most important issue in government financial management is to find the right balance between the government revenue and spending. Some of the economic issues the government is facing were the national deficit, taxes, Medicare reform, retirement, defense, etc. The government must envision sustainability blended with for-profit acumen mindset rather than focusing on ironing out differing political motives of each government official roles.

What accomplishment are you most proud of in your career?

I would start with a saying that "To whom much is given, much is required". Having to work for more than 15 years in the profession, there's a lot of responsibility and challenges that accounting and finance profession entails. As a finance professional, you won't always please everyone as you put controls and held people accountable for their job. Part of my accomplishment is that no matter how difficult the circumstances and consequences can be, it is keeping that values intact and never compromise and stand firm for what is right and just. In addition, given the opportunity to lead people, I have the opportunity to train, mentor and become part of helping that team member to reach their full potential.

What advice would you give a new college graduate joining the field?

Be innovative. Never stop learning. Some fresh graduates tend on staying mediocre after graduating from college. Plan were you want to take your career increase and excel on the chosen field. Strategize on achieving your goals and reinforce your credential with certifications such as CGFM or CPA exams. Perseverance rewards in due time.

What is the best thing about AGA?

It's great to be a member of AGA. You'll find a lot of friends, mentors and increase your network in the field. AGA also offers CPE's and keep its members updated with current events and pressing issues surrounding the government in financial terms. There is also a lot of opportunity for you to give back through volunteerism with all its community projects involvement.
