ABOUT US


AGA Guam Chapter strives to provide educational programs and professional development seminars, which had influenced governmental financial policies and practices within the island of Guam.





CHALLENGES

MEMBERSHIP GROWTH AND RENEWAL

This program year, the AGA Guam Chapter identified challenges in re-engaging inactive members and encouraging membership renewals.

To address this challenge, we are focusing on improving outreach through email and social media by spotlighting current CGFMs and other chapter members. This initiative aims to boost visibility, highlight member benefits and re-engage inactive members.

EVENT PLANNING AND RESOURCE CONSTRAINTS

The AGA Guam Chapter faces issues with organizing professional development events and monthly meetings due to rising event costs such as venues, catering and other fees.

To manage rising event costs, we are actively exploring alternatives such as utilizing free or low-cost venues and to plan events early to secure better rates. While we have successfully hosted in-person membership meetings once a quarter, virtual meetings are still in use and have helped us manage resource limitations.

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT AND RETENTION

The AGA Guam Chapter is currently facing difficulties in maintaining volunteer engagement. Members often struggle to consistently participate due to demanding work schedules, which affects overall involvement. Sustaining volunteer momentum over time has proven difficult, and participation in social events remains lower than anticipated, limiting opportunities for community connection and retention.

To address these challenges, we will consider introducing flexible volunteering options such as virtual roles to accommodate busy schedules and recognition programs and small incentives to help sustain motivation and participation.
